

# **KEY INFORMATION FOR THE WEEK**

I begin with some excellent news that we're keen to share with you. At the end of last week, I received a letter from the Rt Hon Damian Hinds, Minister for Schools. He wrote to congratulate the staff and children on our school's achievements in the 2023 multiplication table check. This is a national test which all children in Year 4 are required to do to determine how well they can recall times table facts. The average pupil score of 24.1 out of 25 which our children achieved last year makes Holy Trinity CofE Primary School, Cookham one of the top 200 performing schools in England for the multiplication tables check. We are incredibly proud of these current Year 5 pupils who tried so hard throughout the year to learn their tables and the staff who worked tirelessly providing motivation and encouragement. We are also incredibly grateful to you for the help and support you give your child as they approach these key milestones in their learning journey. A partnership between home and school is essential in providing the best outcomes for them. # Drawing on our Vision and News from Around the School:

This week in collective worship, our journey through the Bible has taken us back to Canaan and the story of Joseph. On Tuesday Lay Minister, Richard Simmonds, led assembly and spoke about Candlemas. To help the children understand its meaning, he used the painting *The Light of the World'* by English Pre-Raphaelite artist William Holman Hunt. The image now hangs in every classroom.

Modern Foreign Language lessons have continued for Key Stage 2 pupils and Year 3 and Year 4 seem to be enjoying taking on Spanish. Children in Mrs. Pow's Spanish Club are on hand to help others master that tricky authentic accent!

Following the completion of Round 1 last week, Year 5 are now heavily ensconced in preparing for the Learning to Work 'Junior Ascot Bake Off Competition'. This is an event we have entered twice before, winning the first time round. Local schools are tasked with creating and baking a 'Tray Bake' around the theme "A celebration of Royal Ascot with Berkshire sourced ingredients". The Grand Final of the competition will be held at Ascot Racecourse on 11<sup>th</sup> March 2024 and will involve the winning team from each school showcasing their entry to a panel of judges. In celebration, the winning team's tray bake will be promoted and available for sale on the retail menu during race meets this summer. Year 5 are now onto Round 2 so we will keep you informed of our progress.

The big news story of the week has to be the publication of our school newspaper, Trinity Times. When Ben and Rafferty came up with the idea of producing a school newspaper I had no idea just how committed they were. Completely independently, they have put together the newspaper which is incredibly well written and professional in its appearance.

The boys have made the conscious decision to cover only positive local news stories (they felt the news in papers and on television is sometimes rather depressing) and in putting articles together they have gathered facts and interviewed various people. It contains an advert for the Little Bookshop in Cookham after Chantal gave them £10 towards producing the newspaper, and an advert for Print 'n' Projects, the printing company in Cookham who have printed the paper for free. This is an incredibly kind gesture and a real show of community spirit - a good news story all round! If you happen to be passing (27a Station Parade, Station Hill, Cookham), do pop in and tell owner, Steve Evans, how much this has meant to the children.

As those of you who have bought it know, the newspaper costs 50p with all proceeds going each month to a charity, linked to one of the articles published, which the boys choose. This month the money is going to RSPB, following the story about how birds were affected by the recent flood in the village. With 120 copies printed, the boys hope to be able to give £60 to the charity. Do get yours and help them reach this target.

Already they are planning what will go in February's edition but if your child has any ideas for stories they would like featured, they must share their ideas with our fabulous Junior Journalists, Ben and Rafferty. # Book Week – Monday 4<sup>th</sup> to Friday 8<sup>th</sup> March:

If you missed information in last week's newsletter, at the moment we are busy planning Book Week. It runs from 4<sup>th</sup> to the 8<sup>th</sup> March to coincide with World Book Day on 7<sup>th</sup> March. Already we have booked a number of events and, like last time, we will be visiting Chantal at the Little Bookshop in the village. If you would like to be involved in celebrating books and the power of reading by coming in to talk to the children about something related to this topic we would love to hear from you. In the past, parents who work as journalists, or in publishing have spoken. #### Attendance:

As we approach the end of another term, I'm writing to remind you that attendance at school is compulsory unless a child is poorly. Requests for holidays, even if it's just one day, should not be made; I am not permitted to grant them. Absence because a holiday has been taken goes down on a child's record as an unauthorised absence. These unauthorised absences are scrutinised by the school's Education Welfare Officer who meets with me on a regular basis and who requests meetings with parents when attendance becomes a concern.

As I'm sure you can appreciate, any time away from the classroom is incredibly disruptive. A lesson missed puts a pupil at a disadvantage especially when that lesson falls within a sequence of planned learning activities. You may be interested to read findings from some DfE research, published in 2022, which highlights the link between absence and attainment at KS2 and KS4.
