

KEY INFORMATION FOR THE WEEK

It has been another busy week in school with lots of interesting things happening. We've been closely following the journey of Paddington Bear, the mascot we gave to Sarah Parfitt from Partners for Change Ethiopia last Friday, as he made his way from Cookham to the children at Debre Birhan School. You may remember our Lent Project a couple of years ago when the children filled Smarties tubes with pennies that they earned doing jobs around the home. This raised £298.47 for the charity and a year ago another £864.89 was raised through our Christmas campaign. The children set up stalls selling, among other things, bracelets and paper weights which they had loving made, we held a Bags2School collection and you also contributed by donating money after our Nativity performance.

Throughout the eleven years we have worked with Partners for Change we have created links with five schools helping to create a sports ground in one and providing breakfast for children in the other four. We have raised a considerable amount of money and changed the lives of many. Is has been seven years since Sarah visited Ethiopia so we were delighted when she contacted us a fortnight ago to let us know she was heading over there again. Our PfC ambassadors sprung into action writing letters and drawing pictures for her to take out to the children she would be visiting. In return, all this week, she has sent us pictures of Paddington as he's travelled from place to place with her. Sarah is returning to the UK today without Paddington who the children wanted those in Debre Birhan School to have. We hope it won't be long before she comes into school to share with us stories of her adventures! In the meantime, we are planning our next fundraising campaign. The children have already come up with lots of ideas so we're hoping that we'll be as successful as we have been in the past supporting a new group of children who need our help. In other news this week Reception have learnt more about the work of the police force from Police Community Support Officer, Lorraine, who, during her visit, allowed the children to sit in her patrol car. Year 6 have embarked on a study of the artist David Hockney and Year 2 have made good use of the cereal boxes they brought in by making Ferris wheels to complement their study of the book 'Rosie Reveer, Engineer'. Year 1 have also used a story as a basis for their music lesson when they used a variety of instruments to create mood. Year 4 are rehearsing hard for their performance at the Primary Schools' Dance Festival next month and Year 3 have enjoyed looking at play scripts which have led to them acting out scenes from 'The Wind in the Willows'. There was great excitement in Year 5 earlier in the week when Miss Buckley launched the 'Ascot Racecourse and 1711 Junior Bake Off 2025' event. This is an annual competition organised by Learning to Work which we have chosen to take part in for the last three years. Twice we have won so the stakes are high this year! The theme requires entrants to create picnic food, either sweet or savoury, which might be served at Royal Ascot so already the children are considering what to bake and where to source local ingredients. Our winning team will be invited to Ascot Racecourse later in the term to face other schools and a panel of judges who will be deciding who has best met the brief.

Lots of classes took part in a '10@10 Time to Focus' live stream on Wednesday morning which got everyone up and moving. We were one of twenty four schools across the borough taking part which saw 4580 pupils join experts doing a range of exercises all designed to help us keep our brain active. It was lots of fun as was the Sportshall Athletics Competition organised by the Ascot and Maidenhead Sports Partnership at Braywick Leisure Centre yesterday. A team of eighteen Year 4 children went in the morning and a team of eighteen Year 6 children in the afternoon. They took part in a number of athletics events against schools from across the borough. Although we weren't the winning school, the children enjoyed the opportunity to take part and learn more about teamwork and resilience.

RSPB Bird Watch:

On Wednesday the Eco-Council met to discuss this weekend's RSPB Big Garden Bird Watch and consider how they could encourage as many people as possible to get involved. Today in assembly the team showed everyone how to make bird cakes which will be hung in our wildlife area for our feathered friends to enjoy. They are keen to help the RSPB build a picture of how garden birds are faring so do encourage your child to take part. It is very easy. All they have to do is spend an hour watching the birds in your patch between 24th and 26th January recording any that land. Results can be submitted online or by post. Lockdown Drill:

Your child may have come home this week speaking about the lockdown drill we practiced on Tuesday and the fire drill the day before. These were carried out successfully, proving the children are well rehearsed in what to do when either of the alarms go off. As part of our safeguarding policy and procedures, we carry out these tests to ensure that if a real emergency ever occurred effective systems are in place. While you will appreciate the circumstances that might call for a lockdown, we inform the children that it could be an angry dog or a frightened deer that is on the playground so as to not alarm them unnecessarily. The situation was handled sensitively and after the drill lessons resumed as normal.

Online Parent Workshops – to supporting your child through the curriculum:

For those of you who were able, thank you so much for taking the time to complete the short survey following the parent workshops we ran last week. We were grateful to receive many positive comments but we also noted how the timings didn't suit some of you. We apologise that the early slot was too close to the end of the school day for some of you to get home in time and log on, and that those of you who did make it struggled to gain access to the meeting. That wasn't the case for all so we're glad that those of you who could join the sessions found them useful. We will certainly take on board the comments you made but, in the meantime, we hope that for all of you, the slides and supporting material which has been posted on Google Classroom is helpful in guiding you on how to support your child through the curriculum. If you have any questions, staff are always available at the end of the day and can be contacted by email. We also have a second parents' evening coming up at the beginning of March.

Book Week:

On 3rd March, to coincide with World Book Day on 6th March, we launch Book Week. A number of interesting activities are currently being planned all to promote a love of reading. On Friday 7th March the children are invited to come to school dressed as their favourite book character and we hope to have Book Day vouchers to give out so they can make their own book purchase.

Attendance:

I am delighted to report that our attendance figures for this academic year remain high especially given the fact that next week our data will again be reported to the borough before I meet with our Education Welfare Officer at the end of term. Your support remains invaluable.

A lot of research has been carried out on school attendance with the most recent publication, 14th January 2025, now available on line. The report by The House of Commons Library gives an overview of school attendance rules in England, and outlines concerns about increased persistent and severe absence since the Covid pandemic. It refers to the most recent DfE data which recognises a link between absence and attainment and shows that on average, pupils with higher absence over key stage 4 (year ten to year eleven) had lower GCSE attainment in 2019.

Pupils who did not achieve grades 9-4 in English and maths GCSEs in 2019 had an absence rate of 8.8%, compared with 5.2% among pupils who achieved grade 4 in both subjects, and 3.7% among pupils who achieved grade 5 or above.

It perhaps comes as no surprise that pupils who were persistently or severely absent (who missed more than 10% and 50% respectively of possible school sessions) had lower average attainment. 35.6% of persistently absent pupils, and just 11.3% of severely absent pupils achieved grades 9-4 in English and maths (compared to 67.6% of all pupils).

Absence is of course not the only factor that has a link to pupil's attainment but it is something which we continue to monitor closely. Our drive is to ensure every pupil reaches their full potential and we remain grateful for your support in helping us do this.

Keeping Children Safe Online:

With Safer Internet Day looming (11th February), and with one of this year's themes focusing on protecting yourself from online scams, Police Cyber Protect teams from the South East are running their **free** webinar for parents/carers several times in the coming weeks.

The webinar covers social media, mobile phones, gaming and emails, and aims to help parents and carers understanding some of the risks young people face online, including how to spot phishing emails, texts and more. Attendees will be provided with advice and resources to help them better protect themselves and their family from falling victim to cybercriminal behaviours.
