# **Celebrating Earth Day with a Magnificent Achievement:**

On Monday we marked Earth Day. It came immediately after the weekend when six of our climate conscious Year 6 students walked the 14 miles from Cookham to Henley along the river collecting litter as they went. The boys, Ben Brittain, Monty Garrett, Rafferty King, Rory MacMillan, Fred Mellors and Drake Powell, took nine hours to complete the challenge during which they filled thirteen bags of rubbish. Through their efforts they have raised over £1350 in sponsorship for the World Wildlife Fund. We are delighted to be on the bill at this year's Cookham Festival. As you may have seen in last week's newsletter, with the three other Cookham schools we will be performing a cantata telling the story of Toad and his friends through a modern adaptation of 'Wind in the Willow'. ### Parking:

This week I received an email from a neighbour complaining about inconsiderate parking around the village; I trust you saw my request yesterday to park thoughtfully. This was followed up by another four emails, some containing photographs, from parents with children at our school sympathizing with the lady who felt the need to write in initially. All four pointed out very clearly the issues we have:

- Drivers park on the junction of roads, namely School Lane and Sutton Road creating a blind spot for those in vehicles trying to pull out.
- Drivers park on double yellow lines which makes it difficult for pedestrians to cross Sutton Road safely because of the blind spots created.
- Drivers park on pavements which means pedestrians, especially those pushing prams, have to step out into the road to pass.
- Drivers, in an attempt to park as close to school as possible, hold up the traffic on Sutton Road causing those passing through the village to become impatient and aggressive often resulting in them accelerating at points where pedestrians are trying to cross.
- Drivers park directly opposite the gate to the school car park where parents queue at pick up and where children and parents exit. This makes the road very narrow and therefore dangerous for pedestrians, many of whom are children.

The overriding concern of the parents who wrote in, those who spoke to me, all of us in school and you I'm sure, is that if this behaviour is not corrected it could result in a serious accident happening.

From speaking to people and from what I know already, it appears that one of the biggest problems is that there is not enough safe (and legal) parking close to school. Instead of parking safely and legally a little further away, some are choosing selfish parking behaviours over considerate ones. Unsafe, illegal and inconsiderate parking is at the root of the problem.

That said, I am mindful of the fact that the vast majority of parents do abide by the rules and factor in additional time to park further away at drop-off and pick up times. If we were able to create more parking spaces we would, but unfortunately, it's not an option. Therefore, I hope the following might help.

### Drop-Off:

- Rather that having one time that everyone must arrive by in the morning, we have a window of 15 minutes (from 8:45am to 9am) which is in place to ease the congestion.
- Our Early Bird Club operates from 8am which increases the window by half an hour giving you another option.

### Pick-Up:

• It is impractical for us to introduce a staggered pick-up at the end of the day because so many families have children across more than one key stage. This worked during the flooding and during periods of lock-down but longer term it's not viable. However, although the gate is opened at 3:15pm it is not shut until gone 3:30pm so if you arrive and have to park a little distance away, arriving at 3:30pm is not a problem. We would rather you were a little late to pick up your child than you park illegally or inconsiderately.

### Parking Options:

- The National Trust car park on the moor operates free parking for 30 minutes.
- The car park next to the garage on Sutton Road has a number of spaces which can be used for up to 3 hours.
- The Kings Arms has very kindly offered you their car park at drop off and pick up times. However, please vacate the car park quickly once you have collected your child to allow space for their customers.

• We will be promoting National Walk to School Week which runs from 20<sup>th</sup> to 25<sup>th</sup> May. Every year we take part by encouraging parents and children to ditch vehicles or, if this is impractical, to park away from the centre of the village and walk at least some of the way. We notice that this always promotes good habits which often continue beyond the official week so we hope it will be the same this year.

I have spent a considerable amount of time this week talking to local councillors, including our Cookham Parish Councillor, to share concerns and seek solutions. It would appear that wheels are in motion to make positive changes which I trust will be shared with you soon but, in the meantime, I hope some of the solutions I have offered help in allowing us all to act in a safe, legal and considerate manner.

The fact that most of you do all you can to work with our neighbours and ensure a safe environment for our children as they walk to and from school makes writing about this issue difficult; it is not something I relish doing. However, another complaint and a general feeling that others are equally exasperated by the actions of some meant raising it again was necessary. If you have any further solutions, please write in and I will share them with the local councillors who have more power than me to put things in place. Thank you as always for your support.
